CERULEAN CELEBRATION: Patina Gallery Honors Connections and Creativity with A Season of Blue

What do you associate with the color blue?

"It's everything from the sky to the sea," says Patina Gallery co-founder and creative director Ivan Barnett. "When you think about that range, it's a little bit like the range of life. We love the idea of clear sailing and open skies. But what might come up? Things change in our lives. We have dark, sad parts, deep places." Artists will explore this range through a multimedia spectrum of work throughout Patina's A Season of Blue to commemorate the gallery's twenty-third anniversary between June and September this year.

The concept is inspired by the friendship, persona, and performance power of opera soprano Angel Blue (of Fire Shut Up in My Bones fame). "She connects with the color blue. We had to do this, in a way, because she has had such an impact on us. Her coming into the gallery, borrowing Patina jewelry, and wearing it on the opera stage was all magical," says Barnett.

Also magical will be the exhilarating breadth of creativity on display during

Patina's A Season of Blue. For example, in true Santa Fe spirit, Street Blue, a collectible auto exhibition by JP Gonzales, will line downtown Santa Fe's Palace Avenue with a show of collectible cars in various shades of blue on September 16, and automotive photographer Michael Furman will sign book collections of his sleek, dynamic images. Jewelry artist and maker Peter Schmid of Atelier Zobel will delve into blue depths of metal and stone with his stunning Infinite Blue exhibition in August. Barnett presents Abstracting Blue, a series of abstract photographs ("It's a very heartfelt color," he reflects). Designer Claire Kahn shows a collection of special beadwork jewelry in blue and yellow in support of Ukraine in July. A percentage of proceeds from her exhibition More than Blues will be donated to Save the Children.

And there will be much more. "Artists are taking this theme and making it their own," says Barnett. The celebration of artists and their creative freedom is core to Patina's mission. "Artists just want to

create. There aren't many galleries that are founded and operated by artists. Because we're makers, too, we have an extra affinity and understanding with the artists. We ask them to do what they do best: what they love."

Another defining characteristic of Patina Gallery is its connection with the people-from collectors to the creatively curious-who visit. It is these relationships, more than anything, that A Season of Blue will honor.

"Over the last few years, especially during COVID, we realized that we wanted to create even deeper connections with people. 2022 is a year of deeper meaning. We don't just work with clients and customers; these are friends and family, people who deeply believe in what we're doing," says Barnett. "I want people to know they can come here, enjoy themselves, see beautiful art, relish the aesthetic environment, and relax. It's like an oasis." A place of beauty, serenity, and rejuvenation-a place of sparkling blue in the high desert. ×

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INDIGENOUS CELEBRATION NM 2022 A New Mexico Art and Culture Collaboration Like No Other

2022 is a year of momentous celebrations in the realm of New Mexico Indigenous art and culture, marking important milestones for several major Native American institutions with a flurry of festivities, exhibitions, and markets.

A group developed to seize this moment to celebrate those New Mexico organizations with major anniversaries, events, and exhibitions. The entire New Mexico artistic and cultural community was invited to join forces to spotlight Indigenous events across the state with advertising and a comprehensive calendar-website.

The result, Indigenous Celebration NM 2022 was formed. It is the first time in memory that every major New Mexico arts and cultural institution and organization is

cooperating in a comprehensive marketing and communications effort. Currently, forty-two institutions and businesses statewide have joined together in this endeavor to celebrate and promote several special anniversaries.

Honoring 115 years of leadership in archeology, anthropology, and social sciences, the School for Advanced Research is applauding a century of excellence for its Southwest Native American Art Collection. Housed in SAR's Indian Arts Research Center, the collection is noted for its radically participatory approach to stewardship and festivities that includes both lectures and salon discussions focused on issues of broad public concern.

For the past 100 years, SWAIA 's Santa Fe Indian Market has brought together the most



gifted Native American artists from the U.S. and Canada with millions of visitors and collectors from around the world, and this centennial year will be its largest market event.

La Fonda on the Plaza, Santa Fe's landmark hotel and one of the early Harvey House hotels so important to the promotion and sales of Native Art, is programming lectures and tours throughout the year, as it commemorates its 100th anniversary.

In Gallup, the spectacular Gallup Intertribal Ceremonial, one of the oldest continuous recognitions of Native American culture and heritage, which attracts an international audience, is also commemorating its 100th anniversary.

The Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian, New Mexico's oldest nonprofit independent museum has for eighty-five years been presenting unique exhibitions of contemporary and historic Native American art, often focusing on little-known genres or living Native American artists. This year, celebrating its eighty-fifth anniversary, the banner exhibition is a visual dialogue within an important Navajo family of artists: a father, son, and two daughters: Narciso Abeyta, Pablita Abeyta, Elizabeth Abeyta, and Tony Abeyta, which will run through January 2023.

Special shows celebrating Indigenous art and culture will be presented at both the New Mexico History Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Native Art in Santa Fe, applauding its fiftieth anniversary this year.

Fine-art galleries around the state, historical sites, film festivals, and even Santa Fe's historic performing arts center are taking advantage of this year of celebrations by featuring Native American artists. For example, SITE Santa Fe, New Mexico's adventurous contemporary art venue, is mounting two major shows featuring Indigenous artists Jeffrey Gibson (Mississippi Choctaw/Cherokee) and Nani Chacon (Diné).

20th Currents New Media Santa Fe

Currents New Media's mission is to champion new media arts and support artists in creating innovative work. Their annual festival, as well as educational programming and year-round exhibition space, offers the public unique opportunities to experience creative work at the forefront of art and technology.

Parallel Studios, the non-profit organization that produces the Currents New Media Festival, began designing and producing local exhibitions in 2002. They launched Currents New Media in 2010 as an annual, city-wide event.

Since then, the festival has grown into a local favorite. Artists, families, aficionados, and the creatively curious enjoy Currents's presentation of technically fascinating, artistically captivating, and downright fun multimedia work. Convening established and emerging artists from Santa Fe and around the world, Currents New Media brings cutting-edge art and tech—including VR and AR immersive environments, 3D printing, robotics, video, animation, music, and performance to the community. The art is presented in traditional as well as public and outdoor spaces, promoting accessibility and engagement. In 2020, when production was at its most daunting, Currents was able to deliver its annual festival online to more than 6,500 global, virtual attendees in ninety-five countries and every U.S. state.

This year's festival, Currents 2022: Circuits, marks the organization's twentieth anniversary and the festival's return to a full-scale, in-person model with happenings throughout Santa Fe. The event will feature work by more than seventy artists at multiple venues from June 17 to June 26, 2022.

25th Georgia O'Keeffe Museum Santa Fe

In a letter from 1944, Georgia O'Keeffe wrote to Alfred Stieglitz, "I have a beautiful start on a beautiful painting. A start can be so beautiful when it is still partly in my head." This moment is from one of the 600-plus letters that are included in the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum's





collection, among hundreds of other personal items that it has acquired in its quarter-century history.

The museum itself is located in downtown Santa Fe, where exhibitions tell unexpected stories from O'Keeffe's life. On view through October 2022 is *Spotlight on Spring*, featuring a large-scale work the museum recently had repaired and conserved. Accompanying the painting is correspondence between O'Keeffe and her personal expert conservator, Caroline Keck, as well as objects O'Keeffe painted.

Through these interactions with O'Keeffe's own belongings, we catch a glimpse inside her world. More materials like this can be found at the Michael S. Engl Library and Archive, an educational space dedicated to the research and understanding of O'Keeffe and other artists. The library includes books from O'Keeffe's home library as well as other personal property including rattlesnake skeletons, shells, and stones.

The future of the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum is as expansive as the skies O'Keeffe painted. In 2023 they are set to break ground on a new museum space with triple the gallery space, dedicated square footage for collection storage, increased capacity for visitors and educational programming, and a community green space.

30th Southwest Contemporary Santa Fe

Despite Santa Fe's status as one of the nation's top art markets and the simple fact that some of the most interesting art in every medium is being created in New Mexico and the Southwest in general (as all of us who live here know), before Guy Cross established *Southwest Contemporary* (then *THE Magazine*), in 1992, there was precious little coverage of the goings-on here. Now with thirty years on the books, *Southwest Contemporary* is a more vital source of coverage and criticism on contemporary art in the Southwest than ever, with increasingly national distribution as coverage has expanded to include Arizona, Utah, Texas, northern Mexico, Southern California, Nevada, and Colorado.

Offering perspectives, analysis, news, and resources for artists, *Southwest Contemporary* is a touchpoint for expression—promoting the exchange of ideas, techniques, thoughts, and support. Publications like this are an important part of any thriving creative ecosystem, offering space for reflection and dialogues that evolve over time. Here's to thirty more years of deepening the conversation.

The Ark is much more than just a bookstore—in the last forty years, this unassuming little spot has become a place for the community to meet and gather. Quietly tucked into the Railyard District on Romero Street, the Ark has spent the last decades curating a wide selection of books, particularly on all things esoteric. Spanning *The Witches*' *Almanac*, how-to manuals for connecting with your guardian angels, memoirs of your favorite activists, and Paul Stamets's treatises on fungi—the folks at the Ark have that title you thought might be too niche to pick up in town. "Santa Fe is a community of seekers," says owner Joanie Aon, "and they have been like family all these years."

What's more, the Ark also has all the wares you need to support your practice—whether that's your reading practice or your spiritual one. Gemstones, jewelry, candles, cards, bookmarks, textiles, and more are tucked into every nook—making the possibilities for cultivating your psychic gifts, connecting to the other side, or simply hitting your Goodreads goal seem limitless. Celebrate the Ark and its forty years of serving the curious minds of Santa Fe the proper way—by picking up a new book and spending some time with it. For their anniversary sale in May, Aon shared that the Ark will donate a percentage of profits to local non-profits. "The best way to celebrate is to give back to the community that has supported us all these years," she says.





45th Adobe Gallery Santa Fe

At the foot of Canyon Road sits the small but mighty Adobe Gallery. Specializing in Native American work from the late-19th and early-20th centuries, the gallery's collection is in constant flux, with new pieces being delivered daily. On a recent visit, a water bowl from Acoma Pueblo circa 1880 had just arrived.

Adobe Gallery is owned by Alexander E. Anthony, Jr., spry in all of his eighty-nine years of age. A former nuclear engineer in the U.S. Airforce, Anthony fell in love with the richness and breadth of New Mexican culture when he arrived here in 1957. He opened Adobe Gallery's physical space in Albuquerque in 1978, eventually moving it to Canyon Road in 2001.

Anthony knows the collection inside and out and is quick to relay the origin story of each object in the gallery. In addition to rain bowls, the gallery features dough-mixing bowls, weavings, kachina dolls, jewelry, and paintings. The painting collection includes work by students who studied at the Santa Fe Indian School in the 1930s under Dorothy Dunn and other pivotal artists such as Tonita Vigil Peña, who was one of the first Native American women to be recognized as a painter.

Visiting Adobe Gallery feels like opening a treasure chest. The atmosphere is teeming with stories of artists, traditions, and provenance. The gallery celebrates its for-ty-fifth anniversary this summer, with the hopes of an Indian Market–adjacent opening and a party in the works. -DG

50th Nedra Matteucci Galleries Santa Fe

Before the pond in the sculpture garden in the Nedra Matteucci Galleries' compound was a beautifully landscaped haven, it was where art dealer Forrest Fenn kept his alligators, Elvis and Beowulf. Before Fenn kept his alligators there, it was an orchard and farm that provided produce for the neighboring (and still present) Kaune's Neighborhood Market.

Fast forward to 2022—Nedra Matteucci, who with her husband Richard bought the space from Fenn in 1988, has spent the last three decades fostering the gallery with great reverence to its history and commitment to 19th- and 20th-century American art. The sprawling building itself feels like a (very) nice, classic Santa Fe home, with footwide adobe walls, sloping floors, curiously short entryways, fireplaces in almost every room, and incredible artworks.

A mentee of Fenn, Matteucci began her art career traveling throughout the Southwest, selling work as a private dealer, and later working with Fenn at his gallery. Today, the gallery exhibits a stunning collection of work that represents the iconic artists who have found their way to New Mexico, including members of the Taos Society of Artists and Los Cinco Pintores. Matteucci has also curated a beautiful selection of contemporary American artists, many of whom pay homage to the American Southwest in their work. The sculpture garden is considered a Santa Fe must-see and features work by both contemporary and historical artists.

The gallery will celebrate its anniversary on July 15, 2022, with an opening featuring around thirty of the living artists they represent. -DG

50th IAIA Museum of Contemporary Native Arts, Santa Fe

The IAIA Museum of Contemporary Native Arts celebrates its fiftieth anniversary of presenting and elevating contemporary Indigenous art this year. "It's a big deal,"



says director Patsy Phillips (Cherokee Nation). "We are the only museum that only showcases contemporary Indigenous art. People come here for exhibitions, to work with our collections, or they go to the [Institute of American Indian Arts] campus for research to learn about what is happening in the field."

MoCNA's unique perspective promotes intercultural dialogue, scholarship, and creativity. "For example, our current exhibition, *Exposure: Native Art and Political Ecology*, features work from Indigenous artists from Greenland, Australia, Canada, the U.S., and Japan responding to uranium mining or nuclear waste in their communities," says Phillips. "It brings attention to that major and current environmental issue."

The museum also provides invaluable education opportunities to IAIA students, offering mentorships, internships, curatorial experience, and chances to professionally

present. "Every spring, we show the graduating seniors' art and work with student curators," says Phillips.

IAIA is celebrating its sixtieth anniversary this year. Together, the institutions are honoring this milestone with a "Making History" initiative. This includes a documentary film, a stunning book, a multigenerational commemorative portrait of IAIA artists, video vignettes with artists and students, and much more.

60th Institute of American Indian Arts, Santa Fe

The Institute of American Indian Arts has transformed Santa Fe. Over the course of the last sixty years, the college has brought thousands of the brightest Indigenous creatives and thinkers to Santa Fe to study or teach in a broad range of programs—creative writing, filmmaking, studio arts, performing arts, museum studies, and more. Offering associate degrees, bachelor's degrees, three MFA programs (in creative writing, studio arts, and, announced earlier this year, a new program in cultural administration), and certificate programs, the Institute has versatile educational tracks that have shepherded a massive list of notable alumni toward the realization of their

work. Tommy Orange, for example, wrote much of the PEN/Hemingway Award–nominated *There, There* during his tenure in the MFA program. Other alumni include U.S. Poet Laureate Joy Harjo and incomparable poet Layli Long Soldier, as well as genius textile artist Marie Watt, groundbreaking printmaker T.C. Cannon, and the dynamo educator-photographer-curator that is Hulleah J. Tsinhnahjinnie. That's already a long list and it's still a very abbreviated one.

In addition to its degree programs, the Institute hosts a breadth of community programming on its 140-acre campus and around Santa Fe—from workshops and movie screenings to panel talks and open studios with artists in residence. To mark sixty years, IAIA will explore the theme "Making History" throughout the year with events that look to the Institute's past and its bright future. -MG

70th Traditional Spanish Market Santa Fe

Traditional Spanish Market, marking its seventieth appearance in the Plaza this year, provides a deep dive into the Hispanic arts and crafts scene of New Mexico and southern Colorado. More than 200 artists working in dozens of categories, including retablos, ironwork, bone carving, straw applique, and hide painting, showcase their work during the last weekend of July when booths line Santa Fe's Plaza and surrounding streets. The volume and breadth of the work, showing techniques that are passed down by generation, are indicative of how art and crafts are not just popular in Santa Fe but are part of the city's DNA.

The market creates an opportunity to experience traditional Hispanic culture in a broad sense. Every day, musicians and dancers perform on the Plaza stage, and food trucks abound. The phrase "iviva la cultura!" echoes throughout the market. On Sunday, artists can take their work to Mass at the Saint Francis Cathedral where it will be blessed by a priest. Depictions of Christian devotion are common in the work seen at Traditional Spanish Market, illuminating a prominent element of Santa Fe's history.

Traditional Spanish Market is organized by the Spanish Colonial Arts Society, founded in 1925 by writer Mary Austin, to preserve regional Hispanic traditional arts. The society's headquarters in an old adobe building designed by John Gaw Meem house both exhibitions and an in-depth library of Hispanic arts. They traditionally purchase work from the market, imprinting their collection with work from today's Hispanic artists. -DG

85th Wheelwright Museum Santa Fe

The mission of the Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian, celebrating its eighty-fifth anniversary this year, is



"to respect and support, and to record and present, the living traditions and creative expressions of Native American people."

This statement originates in the Wheelwright's founding collaboration between Mary Cabot Wheelwright, a wealthy Bostonian with an interest in cultures and religions, and Hastiin Klah, a respected Navajo medicine man and singer. The two were introduced and became friends in 1921, a time of brutal assimilationist policies that threatened the survival of Navajo religious knowledge and practice. Klah and Wheelwright set out to create a record of Navajo ritual knowledge, including stories, ceremonial sandpaintings, and weavings. The museum opened in 1937 as the Museum of Navajo Ceremonial Art.

In the 1970s, the museum repatriated and donated much of its original collection to the Navajo Nation and changed its name to the Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian. It now presents a unique combination of traditional and contemporary Indigenous art with a focus on living artists.



For example, a powerful recent exhibition, *Indigenous Women: Border Matters*, presented multimedia work by four Indigenous artists exploring concepts of identity, memory, land, heritage, and politics on both sides of the U.S.-Mexico border.

Currently on view in the museum, *Abeyta* | *To'Hajiilee K'é* visually documents a cross-generational, cross-genre dialogue on art and storytelling through the work of the celebrated Abeyta family of master artists.

Established by writer and activist Mary Austin in 1919 as the Santa Fe Players, the theater wasn't formally incorporated until 1922. Then a transient operation, the players officially took up residence in the building where the Santa Fe Playhouse now operates in 1964. The original inspiration for the organization was to present inti-

100th Santa Fe Indian Market Santa Fe

The Southwestern Association for Indian Arts Santa Fe Indian Market celebrates its 100th anniversary this summer with a milestone event. "This market has been a part of our lives for generations, and it speaks to resilience," says executive director Kim Peone (Colville Confederated Tribes/Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians). "This culture was thought to be heading towards extinction 100 years ago. Here we are, coming out of a pandemic, vibrant and celebrating."

For the last century, SWAIA's Indian Market has transformed downtown Santa Fe on a yearly basis, convening artists, collectors, and art enthusiasts in the world's most esteemed Native American art show. The market is estimated to bring more than 115,000 people and \$160 million dollars to the area.

"One of our objectives," says Peone, "is to support all Native art—traditional and contemporary—as fine art. How can we as an organization create opportunities for artists in all spaces? How can we do 365 days of art each year?"

To that end, 2022's market is launching exciting new initiatives. Arts Indigenous invites top-tier galleries from around the country to present work by Indigenous artists. Indigenous Collections, a 21st-century e-commerce platform, will allow vetted artists to sell work year-round online.

"We are bringing back a full-force Indian Market this summer!" exclaims Peone. Indian Market 2022 will take place between August 17 and 21, with a full schedule of events, including a stunning fashion show and live entertainment. ×

FIELD REPORT: Magdalena, NM

POPULATION: 866

ELEVATION: 6,572 feet (the mountains range 6,548–10,783 feet).

TOWN NAME ETYMOLOGY: "Mary Magdalene gazes down from the Magdalena Peak," according to the village website.

FUN FACT: The Magdalena Ranger District for the Cibola National Forest is the oldest continuous business in town.

NOTABLE DISTANCES: 24 miles to the Very Large Array, 25 miles to the Magdalena Ridge Observatory, 29 miles to the Alamo Band of the Navajo Nation's Reservation, 54 miles to Pie Town.

NOTES:

Driving north from the Valley of Fires and Bosque Del Apache National Wildlife Refuge, I take the exit towards the Very Large Array, turning twenty-six miles westward to the village of Magdalena, New Mexico. Clouds break, spotlighting cow and piñon-dotted hills that are déjà vu, pulled straight from the paintings of Peter Hurd.

This small village retains the charm of being ghost town adjacent, the historic trail's end for cattle drives, and outpost for the once-active Kelly Mine. (Interestingly, the mine's headframe was designed by *that* Eiffel.)

My guide, Hills Snyder, introduces me to more than a few Magdalenans. The same gusting wind that animates local Michael Mideke's sound art pushes us along between visits. A former area fire-chief, Mideke chuckles about a propane maintenance man "steadfastly ignoring the madness," the cacophony raised by his backyard sound garden, a collection of various cans, lids, and random objects made into chimes.

Magdalena is home to artists, gallerists, teachers, astronomers, chefs, authors, farmers and firefighters—most with some combination of these descriptives. Many are born and raised in the area, or prodigal sons and daughters returned, coastal exurbanites, and "dark-skies" seekers. The art folks here have the rhizomatic quality of aspens in local painter Estelle Roberge's work: individuals connected by the experience of developing in this particular place.





ART AND CULTURE

Warehouse 1-10

Artist Catherine DeMaria directs the art space in a former feed store, which she and her spouse, Athena Gassoumis, ran as such for years after moving to Magdalena, based on a good premonition, from New York. A recent exhibition, *380/A Thread Between Two Artist Communities*, showcased several Magdalena-based artists. Judy Richardson, who moved here from New York in early 2020, sculpts found-object assemblages in her studio down the block from Warehouse 1-10. Also from the East Coast, married artists Sigrid McCabe and Michael Bisbee moved to Magdalena in 2006. Bisbee's bisected color-field paintings are reminiscent of plant root systems or maps. McCabe's humorously anthropomorphized ceramics grace several places around town—you can't miss them. warehouse110.com

kind of a small array

A petite gallery adjacent to Warehouse 1-10, kind of a small array started in 2018 by Hills Snyder, an artist, writer, and musician from San Antonio, Texas. Programming continues to include a formidable roster of mostly-Southwestern artists. hillssnyder.com

Navajo artist Eddie Tsosie is represented at La Posada Art Gallery (with a mural of his work adorning the exterior wall) and 802 Artworks & Gifts. Tsosie's colorful paintings depict the Southwest through modern and traditional Diné customs.

REQUIRED READING

While planning your stay, please pick up a copy of the following local books, including Stephen Bodio's **Querencia** (1990, Clark City Press), which took less than a day to read cover to cover. This autobiography peers into the author's admirations and observations of his love, Betsy, and Magdalena, often in concurrence.

Bruce Holsapple's **Wayward Shadow Poems** (2013, La Alameda Press) is peppered with humor to counter the harsher realities of life, and is a portrait of *place*. An excerpt from the poem "Elevation": "*I know you*, I say / kneeling, then peer down / over my shoulder / to the place where I first learned / this weed, "Goat's Beard" / saw *through* myself / to that desperate time / the distance / took my breath."

Krista Arias's **Xingona Girl Smoke: the pace and posture of permission** (2021, Tlatolli Café-Press) is a short collection that gracefully weaves into a singular overarching poem, that of a "Xicana Indígena mother's... only daughter's coming-of-age ceremony, which ends up also being her own." The book enthralls through the lens of relationship, body, land, history, dreams, and death. **Xingona Girl Smoke** was conceived through Arias's own small-press project, Tlatolli Café-Press, housed in Magdalena's 1918 Roosevelt Schoolhouse.

MISCELLANY

Of the many gems Magdalena offers, the Astronomical Lyceum—a decommissioned gymnasium filled with telescopes and an extensive astronomy library, gathered by astronomer and history enthusiast John Briggs—is an unusual treat. Briggs himself is the *most* encyclopedic element of the Lyceum, and a willing conversationalist. Keep an eye out for the Enchanted Skies Star Parties of the future, or make an appointment to see the Lyceum for yourself.

SPACE IS THE PLACE

Santa Fe Gets a New Home for Art in the Vladem Contemporary

When the New Mexico Museum of Art, as it is known today, was established in 1917, it was founded under the premise that it would display contemporary art from regional, national, and international artists. While the contemporary art field has grown and morphed, the original New Mexico Museum of Art building, with all of its old-school constraints, has more or less remained the same.

This fall, the New Mexico Museum of Art will unveil a new contemporary art space, a first-of-its-kind in the state. The New Mexico Museum of Art Vladem Contemporary, buoyed by private and public monies, will become one of the newest and highest-profile tenants of the ever-changing Santa Fe Railyard. It's the first significant expansion of the downtown state-run museum since the 1917 opening of its Pueblo Revivalstyle building on West Palace Avenue—and it's happening at a crucial time for regional contemporary arts.

Museum officials say that the \$16.5 million, 35,000-square-foot building will not only allow the cultural institution to expand its educational offerings and curatorial programming—along with a brand-new artist-in-residence program—but it will also help alleviate unrelenting storage issues for the museum. While proponents are applauding the addition to the Santa Fe art scene, opponents say that the new space, which eliminated a revered landmark in the Multicultural mural, is another sign of rapid gentrification of the city. The art piece—painted in 1980 by lead artist Gilberto Guzmán, along with members of the community and students from the Institute of American Indian Arts—represented a sense of place and belonging for Chicano and Indigenous people. Opposing parties disagreed on whether the more than forty-year-old mural, which had deteriorated, could have been affordably restored.

The expanded Vladem, currently under construction at South Guadalupe Street and Montezuma Avenue, is scheduled to open this fall.

"This museum will add to Santa Fe's general interest in contemporary art," says Mark White, New Mexico Museum of Art executive director. "It can be seen as a complement to what's going on at SITE Santa Fe, [the Institute of American Indian Arts's Museum of Contemporary Native Arts], and the local galleries.

"I think one of the important distinctions is that, as a collecting institution, we're going to be collecting more broadly than any of our colleagues across the



city," adds White. MoCNA's collections focus on Native American and Indigenous art while SITE Santa Fe and the Center for Contemporary Arts are non-collecting institutions.

In 2014, as the New Mexico Museum of Art approached its centennial, museum officials brainstormed future opportunities. They eventually landed on constructing a new and separate space to display and house contemporary art. In New Mexico, only a handful of institutions, such as the Albuquerque Museum and Santa Fe's Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian, collect contemporary works. White says they'll acquire pieces from regional, national, and international artists.

A year after the museum's 2017 centennial, Santa Fe philanthropists Bob and Ellen Vladem, both originally from Chicago, gave a \$4 million gift, the single largest donation in the museum foundation's history, for in-perpetuity naming rights. Additionally, the state of New Mexico chipped in more than \$6 million towards construction costs as part of the museum's \$12.5 million fundraising campaign.

White says that the museum—which will hire eleven additional positions, increasing the overall New Mexico Museum of Art workforce to forty staff members received \$850,000 from the general budget approved during the 2022 New Mexico Legislature; \$200,000 of that money is a special appropriation, he says. The building's construction, which began ramping up in February 2021 following funding and pandemic delays, angered some of the community due to the destruction of the Multicultural mural, which displayed New Mexico's multicultural heritage from pre-colonization to



modern times. Local activists and groups such as Keep Santa Fe Multicultural attempted to save the mural during a contentious back-and-forth covered by local and national arts media.

A district court records search shows that Guzmán filed suit in March 2021 against the New Mexico State

Department of Cultural Affairs (which oversees the state's arts and cultural heritage agencies, including the New Mexico Museum of Art), and the City of Santa Fe in an attempt to halt the 15,000-square-foot addition to the 20,000-square-foot former Halpin Building. According to a court document, the case was settled in September 2021. The parties agreed that Guzman will create a pared-down version of the mural, which was covered as part of the construction, inside of the Vladem Contemporary lobby, reported the *Santa Fe New Mexican* and *Santa Fe Reporter*. The legal settlement ensures that the mural, in its replicated form, will still be accessible to the public.

Once completed, the New Mexico Museum of Art Vladem Contemporary will include nearly 10,000 square feet of new exhibition space in a two-level gallery, with public-facing exterior displays including a video projection system and a "Window Box Project" that will showcase three annual installations by local emerging artists. The newest occupant of the Railyard—home of the Santa Fe Farmers' Market, SITE Santa Fe, and El Museo Cultural de Santa Fe—will also feature outdoor spaces for community gatherings, including a second-floor terrace with views of the surrounding mountains.

One of the biggest pluses for museum officials will be the addition of a dedicated educational center that can accommodate up to 100 people, something that is absent from the Plaza building. The Vladem will have a classroom programmed with continuous educational opportunities; one of the first classes will be a threeweek cell-phone photography course.

"We're really setting our sights on working more closely with the public schools in Santa Fe in a way that we really have not been able to do thus far. It is our ambition to bring one grade of the public schools into the museum on an annual basis," explains White, who adds that family days will take place on select weekends.

Additionally, a new artist residency program, scheduled to begin in January 2023, will feature five artists each year—two artists from the Land of Enchantment and three nationwide or international creatives.

"We really want them to engage with the community, whether that is the community of New Mexico at large, working with our museum collections, or with other institutions in town. We want there to be a regional relevance to what they're working on," says curator Merry Scully, who adds that many of the 2023 artists in residence will have a connection to the Vladem's inaugural exhibition, *Shadow and Light*. The Vladem's debut show, scheduled to take place this fall through September 2023, will feature works by Angela Ellsworth, Nancy Holt, Agnes Martin, Helen Pashgian, Susan York, Judy Chicago, Virgil Ortiz (Cochiti Pueblo), and more.

Scully says that the additional space will allow the museum to expand its curatorial program.

"We will be able to have more shows and it will allow us to work more deeply on the postwar contemporary part of the collections," she says. "We're really limited by the amount of space we have in [the Plaza building] and the types of things that we can show."

Perhaps the most crucial aspect of the new space will be the additional 4,100 square feet for storing museum acquisitions. As of late March 2022, the storage facility at the Plaza building for the museum's 20,000-piece collection was at ninety-eight percent capacity.

"Storage is a real concern for us and contemporary art tends to fill up those spaces fairly quickly. It will allow us to move a lot of our contemporary collections over to that space so that they'll be more readily available over there on one end, and it will allow us to free up room [at the Plaza building]," White explains. "We're getting to the point that we might not be able to collect for much longer without that expanded space. That's going to be a real godsend," says White, who adds that there will be a visible upstairs storage space for Vladem visitors.

"They'll be able to see some things that aren't necessarily on view in the gallery, but they can get a glimpse of certain objects within the collection," he says. "We will also have a study space downstairs that will allow researchers and students to work more closely with objects from our collection. That's not something we really have the space to do now." "[Vladem Contemporary] allows us to broaden the scope of who we reach and what we show. It's going

to be exciting in that we are provided with different kinds of opportunities for artists in that building and it also addresses changes in the art scene in Santa Fe in an expansive and positive way."

Overall, Scully says that the Vladem Contemporary will enhance local arts while staying true to its original purpose. "It furthers the mission of the museum from the very beginning when we were first founded, which was to show contemporary art," she says. "What's exciting is it allows us to broaden the scope of who we reach and what we show. It's going to be exciting in that we are provided with different kinds of opportunities for artists in that building and it also addresses changes in the art scene in Santa Fe in an expansive and positive way." ×



GROUNDBREAKING:

A Community-Curated Exhibition of Pueblo Pottery Debuts in Santa Fe

Any pottery piece that was made long ago speaks to me, and I feel a strong connection to these vessels. The creation of clay, the mixtures, the coiling and shaping, the tools used, and finally the process of firing the completed piece—all are awe-inspiring. I feel empowered by our ancestors, because they knew how these pieces should be made and completed. Our ancestors were ingenious, and our people remain so today.

Pottery is an art form that has sustained Pueblo peoples since our emergence onto this world. Pottery has deeper meanings in our culture than decorative jars sold on the market. As in the past, it has served utilitarian, aesthetic, and spiritual purposes. Pueblo potters pass their knowledge and techniques from generation to generation. Over time, pottery making has evolved with differing techniques, shapes, tempers, and designs. Many talented potters today use traditional methods to create pottery, while others push the limits with innovative and stylish designs, and still others blend traditional and contemporary methods. Collectors value all types of our pottery.

Pueblo pottery is unique, with each community having its own methods to create ceramics with differing types of clay, color schemes, paints, designs, shapes, and firing techniques. The ability of potters to shape their creations without a wheel is a remarkable feat. Our ancestors who made pottery had a keen sense of artistic style and often made pots with near perfect symmetry. Pottery crafting in the Pueblo households truly links the past with the present and future.

Surviving an all too often dark and ugly past resulting from Spanish and United States' attempts to destroy Pueblo culture, pottery making continues to sustain Pueblo cultures and their economic livelihood. Museums too have a dark past of unethical collection practices and imposing an authoritative voice over other people's cultures, where little to no community consultation occurred. Thus, it is no surprise why many Indigenous peoples have preconceived notions and negative views of museums. There is much work still to be done and much more consultation which needs to happen. However, times are shifting towards more inclusive voices in museum spaces.

Now, a historic event is in the making. The year 2022 marks the 100-year anniversary of the founding of the Indian Arts Research Center collection at the School for Advanced Research in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Pueblo pottery will be central to this centennial celebration. The Vilcek Foundation has partnered with SAR to showcase their first major exhibition titled *Grounded in Clay: The Spirit of Pueblo Pottery.* It will open on July 31 at the Museum of Indian Arts and Culture in Santa Fe, and will feature more than 100 historic and contemporary works of Pueblo pottery.

Remarkably, the Pueblo Pottery Collective, a group of more than sixty individuals from twenty-one tribal communities, is curating *Grounded in Clay* in collaboration with the collections of SAR in Santa Fe and the Vilcek Foundation in New York, with objects from the nineteen New Mexico Pueblos, Ysleta del Sur Pueblo of Texas, and the Hopi Tribe of Arizona. This development reflects the growing empowerment of Pueblo potters to take charge of





the processes involving the defining, shaping, contextualizing, and displaying of their craft.

SAR's *Guidelines for Community Collaboration*, first published in 2017, is a helpful web-based resource that provides insightful information about how and why museums and Indigenous communities should work collaboratively on projects. *Grounded in Clay* applies this collaboration model to the project, with the museums overseeing this project enabling the potters to write their own narrative about their works selected for display. This kind of largescale collaboration is rare and unique in that the exhibition was not curated by a small museum curatorial team but rather by individuals from Pueblo communities whose pottery is represented in the exhibition.

Often, Pueblo pottery has been referenced from an ethnocentric, Western point of view or from a fine-arts perspective. For this exhibition, however, Pueblo people themselves stand distinctly as authoritative voices with the ability to share, define, and conceptualize the works represented from a personal connection. This achievement must have something to do with the decolonizing winds of change.

Elysia Poon, the director of IARC, noted the significance of having *Grounded in Clay* open at MIAC, on Pueblo lands, the lands that gave birth and a cultural essence to the vessels to be displayed. In addition, she mentioned the members in the collective are representing their personal connections to clay, rather than representing their whole community. The Pueblo Pottery Collective is made up of artists, writers, professors, and community leaders. Some of the co-curators include such noted artists as Kathleen Wall (Walatowa/Jemez), Diego Romero (Cochiti Pueblo), Michelle Lowden (Acoma Pueblo), and Rose Simpson (Kha'p'o Owingeh/Santa Clara Pueblo). The group is as diverse as it is creative. Its members expressed their personal perspectives as they planned and reached a consensus about the exhibition. In other words, they decided collaboratively on the themes and narratives that will be seen.

Grounded in Clay will feature around 100 vessels, all of which have their own intimate story, stories told by the Pueblo Pottery Collective co-curators. The exhibition will explore themes of utility, elements, connections through time and space, and ancestors.

"Traditional" curation models for Indigenous art have often come from a singular perspective, with one voice interpreting the art, often from non-Indigenous curators. This is why *Grounded in Clay* is so remarkable because of its empowering effect that privileges and highlights personal narratives from Pueblo people themselves. Each member of the collective selected up to two works and wrote their personal narrative about the pottery for viewers to read. The museums involved merely served as facilitators during the communal planning, discussion, and selection process.

Brian Vallo (Haak'u/Acoma Pueblo), Pueblo Pottery Collective member and former director of the IARC at SAR, played a major role in the development of this project. Vallo noted that during his term as director of the

Indian Arts Research Center, he established a relationship with New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art and later with the Vilcek Foundation. Discussions with the Met led to the idea of featuring the IARC Pueblo pottery collection in the American Wing at the Met.

Tony Chavarria (Kha'p'o Owingeh/Santa Clara Pueblo), a member of the Pueblo Pottery Collective and curator of ethnology at MIAC, also provided his insights and experiences working on this project. When asked about the collaboration for this project and the inclusion of so many diverse Pueblo voices, he responded, "This is one of the most collaborative projects I've ever been involved with; this project has been this intense community collaboration. The people involved were able to be involved as much as they wanted to, from start to finish. The participants were very engaged. The Collective members brought their life's knowledge and are sharing it with people. The Collective members were able to select the works they wanted to write about. Many selected vessels were not perfect, or were broken, because it is a part of the story."

I then asked Chavarria what his favorite part of the project was, and he replied, "It was listening to the other artists when they shared their write-ups. The Collective members wrote from their own perspective, from their own experience, so there were a wide range of voices. The write-ups were very personal and relatable."

Museum and community collaborations are important as they show institutions are taking steps away from a long history of unethical collection practices and assuming the authoritative voice of other people's culture. This large-scale community collaboration could serve as a model for other museums to adopt. This is important as it shows Indigenous museums and Indigenous communities the extent of what collaboration could look like. Consultation with Indigenous communities is starting to become more widely practiced by museums. Tribal consultation and inclusion of Indigenous voices allows Indigenous communities to ensure culturally accurate and appropriate information is being dispersed in a manner they approve.

There is so much work involved in pottery making; although it is a labor-intensive job, potters continue to carry on the tradition in order to preserve Pueblo culture in our communities. For many Pueblo people, we have grown up around family members who make pottery or been around pottery our whole lives. This is what is so beautiful about this exhibition because so many of the Collective members can relate on a personal level to the works represented which will be seen in their write-ups. It is rare to hear so many Indigenous contributors in a museum space share their personal connections and knowledge. This is a wonderful opportunity to learn and see the diverse artistic styles which differ from Pueblo to Pueblo ranging from historic to contemporary works. Grounded in Clay: The Spirit of Pueblo Pottery is truly an exhibition you will not want to miss. ×

Adrian Aguirre

Las Cruces, New Mexico is located just forty-one miles north of the U.S.-Mexico border, where cross-national migration is a daily occurrence. Adrian Aguirre has witnessed this migration and evolving migration policies firsthand. The artist grew up in Ciudad Juárez at a time when the border between El Paso and Juárez was relatively open and families would commute across the border to go grocery shopping or even for work. Aguirre now resides in Las Cruces where he is an educator and artist, exploring issues of migration through representational drawing and painting.

Migrantes (2019-21), a series of drawings and paintings, illustrates many of the mundane and tedious aspects of migration, such as waiting in line for water, walking through tent camps, and casual conversations. The series also includes several intimate portraits where a figure is forward-facing, gazing toward the viewer and rendered meticulously in charcoal or oil. Aguirre carries the same portraiture approach and thoughtful style of rendering to another series titled *Jornaleros* (2008-10), which depicts Texas day laborers and expands on the migration experience. Portraits of men confronting the viewer with blank documents define the series, suggesting the violence of bureaucracy and the unequal power dynamic between migrants and law enforcement.

In a third series, *Patrol* (2022), Aguirre shifts his focus from the migrant to the enforcers of United States migration policy: border patrol. Three charcoal drawings are clearly sourced from the widely circulated 2021 photographs of Texas border patrol on horseback in pursuit of Haitian migrants. Aguirre's study of these photographs results in images that display in no uncertain terms the hierarchy of power over those who migrate and the inhumanity inflicted by U.S. border policy. ×

Morgan Barnard

Morgan Barnard finds kinetic possibility in digital art, clearing trails that connect generative tools directly to the land. His filmmaker dad nurtured within him a slow way of seeing.

"My work as an artist returns to these early impressions when images, sounds and light spoke directly to me, their shapes and colors a language altogether separate from the story they had originally been created to tell," Barnard says.

"One of the things that I feel connects New Mexico with expanded cinema is that there is no singular focus in New Mexico," Barnard says. "It is immersive—everywhere you look you see open horizons, expansive skies, and nearly daily lightshows. I want to create works where the focal point is not restricted to a single screen or identifiable cinematic technique."

Wide-spanning, collaborative, public manifestations of this approach reach outside Barnard's home base. *Tilikum Light* (2015) uses data from the Willamette River in Portland, Oregon to control dynamic lighting on the Tilikum Crossing bridge. *Sublimare* (2013) connects information sent from a buoy off the coast of California to an installation at the San Diego airport.

His roots in free jazz—Barnard studied tenor saxophone under Glenn Spearman—appears subtly when installation works like *Light Between* (2022) fracture and pulse for a viewer otherwise lulled by the ambient glow of lumia light boxes, an impression of the air after a storm. Each work is made to stoke the imaginations of passers-through.

"After working so physically, I am shifting back to creating virtual and simulated experiences that are directly interactive with an audience," Barnard says.

In the fall, Barnard's work will return to Pie Projects in Santa Fe, which hosted his first solo gallery show. He hopes to develop a series of live cinema performances with live music, projections, and light art at the intersection of storytelling and improvisation. ×

Amelia Bauer

Amelia Bauer's series *On Ruins* (2020-21) is a disorienting visual experience of confused scale and perspective. The artist's playful approach to the subject of ruins—ancient and contemporary—acts as a perceptual leveling device. Mammoth cinder blocks rest next to a free-floating wooden house frame that intersects at an impossible angle with a deteriorating Roman column in a scene that has ambiguous dimensionality. The use of scale and dimension in this body of work speaks to the often arbitrary value placed on the cultures of certain time periods, such as Classical antiquity. When something as lowly as a cinderblock occupies the same confusing space as a Roman column, who's to say one has more value than the other?

Bauer implements a multi-stage process of mediation to break down the barriers between two and three dimensions. In the first stage, she begins in the third dimension with small architectural sculptures that are then photographed in a studio. In the second stage of mediation, the work exists as a flattened image in the form of an archival print. Next, Bauer cuts out the forms from their backgrounds and prints them onto aluminum and foam core which are arranged into three-dimensional installations. For viewers of the work in a gallery setting, this is the final stage. Since mediation is at the core of this work, an additional stage could be considered: the photo documentation of the installation–a flat image of objects that hold both twoand three-dimensional qualities.

The work brings to mind the grainy black-and-white photos found in mid-century art history books—great monuments reduced down to tiny representations. The rhetoric of Walter Benjamin suggests that those reproductions reduce the "value" of the monuments. Bauer, in contrast, harnesses the power of mediation to reshape what can be considered monumental. ×

Nina Elder

Multidisciplinary artist Nina Elder explores geology, ecological processes, and deep time while addressing social justice and transformation. Migrating between rural regions of New Mexico and Alaska, she employs research, drawing, public art, community-based projects, performance, pedagogy, and writing to consider humanity's dependence and impact on the natural world.

"My work right now is about changes happening on a planetary scale and finding the intrigue and beauty that exists in human consciousness," she explains. Elder considers herself an artist and researcher whose work focuses on "changing cultures and ecologies."

Elder's creative practice centers on curiosity, empathy, collaboration, and storytelling as means to dismantle biases and binaries, such as environmentalism versus capitalism. Drawing on source material including historical documents and classified photographs, Elder seeks to elevate overlooked stories and erased legacies.

For more than five years, she traveled full-time in a pachyderm-colored van named for the Dr. Seuss character Horton, but her home base is a trailer (with an outhouse) in the New Mexico desert. For her meticulous large-scale drawings depicting "the geologic interruptions and human-made destruction of specific places," Elder sources materials from various sites, then prepares them in a coffee grinder. "I've used radioactive charcoal, stardust, and pulverized guns to make pigments," she says.

Before the pandemic, Elder was focused on several long-term projects across the U.S. "COVID-19 changed everything," she recalls. In recent years, she's shifted to community writing workshops and murals, as well as video installation and performance-based work in which her own body is a site for considering issues at the heart of her practice.

"I hope my work helps people develop geological empathy and realize that the planet is a shared home for all of us," she says. "Curiosity could save the world." ×

Welly Fletcher

Albuquerque-based artist Welly Fletcher's sculptural works focus on "the diagonal as a literal manifestation of queer politics." In doing so, they act as material forms of resistance "to the straight, right angles of the normative world."

Rooted in the feminist theory of Judith Butler, the cyborg theory of Donna Haraway, and the queer phenomenology of Sara Ahmed, Fletcher's practice activates lines that question normative gender roles, sexual orientation, and identity. These diagonals challenge our adherence to binary thought, hierarchical systems, as well as patriarchal, heteronormative, white supremacist ideologies.

More than providing a critique of the center, though, Fletcher's artworks offer an alternative vision of more equitable worlds by creating "objects that enact support and interdependence," instead of "singular monoliths." For instance, the artist, who uses she/they pronouns, composes some of their sculptures from multiple elements which are used to balance, lift, level, or secure one another. Similarly, they use felt, wood, clay, and steel in order to demonstrate the manner in which disparate materials interact so as to develop a holistic experience comprised of a "plurality [of] bodies."

With so much material and formal attention given to interdependence, it should come as no surprise that the artist champions collaborative endeavors.

"Collaboration," Fletcher says, "is often an element of my overall practice, which manifests as projects made with other artists and as objects that may require the viewer's participation to complete." Such practices and projects foreground the communal and interdependent nature of existence, promoting a more egalitarian and inclusive platform than the rugged-individualist mythos often associated with the American West.

Fletcher, who also teaches in the art department at the University of New Mexico, hopes that her "artworks can provide alternate paths and possibilities. I believe the expanded field of sculpture—and my work within it offers increasingly rare opportunities for an embodied, intersectional, poetic experience of otherness." ×

Eric J. Garcia

Born and raised in Albuquerque's South Valley, Eric J. Garcia's playful modes of political confrontation manifest in prints, sculpture, murals, and installation art. His artistic voice carries the sensibilities of Mexican muralists and U.S. comic book illustrators. This blend of powerful largesse and light-handed satire—elements that have caused major social impact throughout history—puts Garcia at the forefront of political artists working in New Mexico today. He collaborates across the country and internationally as a core member of the printmaking collectives Instituto Gráfico de Chicago and the Justseeds Artists' Cooperative.

Woven throughout Garcia's commentary is the disillusion he experienced during and after his time in the U.S. Air Force. *War Nest* (2016) is a circular sculpture made with wooden guns. At four feet high and twelve feet wide, it is large enough to crawl inside, but you wouldn't want to: wooden panels stuck through the center threaten to impale.

"The main idea of *War Nest* is that it is a metaphor of our own nurtured violent society of the United States," Garcia says. "This nest is the habitat that has incubated a society that is militarized and weaponized. And we see this play out every day with all the gun violence, mass shootings and abundance of arms that floods our streets," Garcia says.

The personal often meets the political in Garcia's work. Sometimes, as with *War Nest*, the result is sharp-edged. Garcia's tender side comes through in other works with humor and an unmistakable affection for people.

"In my lithograph print of my late cousin Jose [Maria Perea III]," Garcia says, "I not only memorialize this man's great achievements, but document a cultural history of New Mexico that is no longer known, much less practiced."

The artist gifts readers that history with A Journey Through New Mexico, a book Garcia published with his sister Judy Garcia. And this summer the windows of Printed Matter in New York City will feature an installation by Garcia and Aaron Hughes, commissioned as a veterans' response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. ×

Inspired by the visual iconography of Blackfoot painted lodges, Santa Fe–based artist Terran Last Gun/ Sah'kwiinaamah'kaa (Piikani) is working to create a new aesthetic in the tradition of Indigenous ledger drawings by using geometric abstractions rather than representational imagery.

His crisp, minimalist drawings made with colored pencils on gifted sheets of ledger paper explore "the varying relationships between color, shape, nature, and sky." Various dates stamped on the antique papers prompt Last Gun to consider what his own people, and other Indigenous peoples, were experiencing at the time.

Born in Montana, Last Gun moved to New Mexico to attend the Institute of American Indian Arts, where he earned degrees in museum studies and studio art. In addition to drawing, his creative practice includes printmaking, painting, and photography. He's also painted murals, which reflect his affinity for pop art and op art.

Last Gun describes his work as a visual interpretation of nature, the cosmos, cultural narratives, and recollections of home. By pulling out the land, geography, and symbols of painted lodges, he's seeking to counter cultural appropriation. Beyond making art, Last Gun is advocating for increased access for Indigenous peoples to the objects from their Nations that are housed in museum collections. "From our cultural perspective these are living things, and they need to be reanimated," he explains.

In 2024, Last Gun will have his first solo art exhibition in Montana. Even so, he plans to stay in Santa Fe, where he's excited about bringing his Plains Indigenous perspective to the Southwest. Last Gun says he's looking for more places to show his work beyond Native-centric markets. "Indigenous art history is American art history," he says. "I want to be part of that conversation." ×

Caroline Liu

Caroline Liu—a painter, seamstress, and muralist currently living and working in Albuquerque, New Mexcio creates vibrant works of art that fuse realistic representations of the human form with abstract grounds and lively color palettes indebted to pop art.

"I create fantastical narratives that bind together magic and realism," Liu says, which "spark larger conversations of loss, joy, and the eternity of self." Through these themes, the artist, who uses she/they pronouns, intends to transport "viewers into [her] daydreams, [which she fills] with bright pops of colors, textural elements, and refractive light."

While painting worlds that foster a liminal space between the real and the imaginary in order to explore complex human emotions is the broad, human-level motive for her work, Liu's art also serves a deeply personal and idiosyncratic function.

They conceptualize their art as a bridge between "two unique perspectives that form [their] identity." To this extent, the artist notes: "My work explores my experiences as a late-diagnosed AuDHD (autistic and ADHD) person and my tribulations with short-term memory loss as a result of multiple concussions [over the course of] the last decade."

The focus on her diagnosis and head trauma certainly provoke serious conversations about mental health and memory loss, but her choice of colors and designs invokes a sense of light-hearted playfulness. This tension Liu generates between the sobriety of her themes and the ecstatic veneer of her aesthetic push her paintings into nuanced spaces that ask the viewer to enter ambiguous realms of thought and feeling.

Liu, who earned a BFA in painting and drawing from the University of New Mexico, has exhibited their work in several galleries throughout the Midwest and Southwest. While they now reside in New Mexico, they spent a large portion of their twenties living in Chicago, painting murals for international companies. ×

Lucy Maki

The way we navigate space on an everyday basis drills out any sense of ambiguity. Each quest is for an answer: find the destination, measure the distance for time.

Lucy Maki's paintings can present themselves like off-kilter hallways or streets in the glance of someone in a hurry to arrive somewhere else. And so it's magical when the goal disappears from an attentive viewer's experience as they traverse the space in and around her paintings.

Geometry and architectural mechanisms in her paintings reference the certainty offered by built environments. It's Maki's slant, playful gestures and textures that transcend our associations with anything sure. "Allusions intertwine with illusions in the end result," Maki says. "I paint with an empty mind." She works intuitively with pure form like New Mexico's Transcendental Painting Group and sees herself in the lineage of its members, who were active in the 1930s. Maki's process is as much a mystery to her as it is for the viewer. After her solo show *Out of the Blue* at Exhibit/208 wrapped in March, she began documenting every phase of her paintings' development to track these impulses.

"I have become most curious about identifying the original motivation and then the point at which that motivation is tossed to the wind or forgotten and something unexpected and exciting emerges," Maki says.

New Mexico's connection with the origins of modernist abstraction drew the artist to move to Albuquerque. The sculptural ambitions of her paintings are becoming secondary to her use of color: *Labyrinthine Constructs* (2022), a series of six canvases, bursts with amaranth, lime, and deep oranges.

You can find Maki's work at Exhibit/208 and in the collections of the New Mexico Museum of Art in Santa Fe, the Albuquerque Museum of Art and History, and the University of New Mexico Art Museum. ×

Tigre Mashaal-Lively

SANTA FE, NM

Tigre Mashaal-Lively, a multidisciplinary artist who moved to Santa Fe in 2019, creates monumental sculptural and immersive works that address both individual and collective trauma and healing.

Informed by their own experience as a Black, mixedrace, genderqueer artist, Mashaal-Lively, who uses they/ them pronouns, works to transcend and dissolve dichotomies and boundaries through sculpture, painting, and other media. Their art practice is heavily influenced by Afrofuturism, solarpunk, and mycopunk. "My work reflects all my lineages," says Mashaal-Lively. "But it also reflects my own experiences with depression and anxiety."

The artist's best-known work includes an interactive, figurative twenty-one-foot sculpture titled *The Solacii*, which was damaged by suspected arson in 2021. It's since been refurbished and reinstalled, even as Mashaal-Lively has been working on other projects, including a recently installed steel public art sculpture called *CoyoteSong*, which explores the complex relationships between overlapping communities such as humans and coyotes.

For this year's Burning Man, they're creating an interactive sculpture titled *Facing the Fear Beast*, which is conceived as a child confronting a nightmarish beast. Inside the beast there's a wounded child living with fear, trauma, and aggression. "People will stand with the child, stand in solidary with them," explains Mashaal-Lively. "It's a way to create a sense of compassion and help people process their own experiences."

Mashaal-Lively also works to amplify other voices in the community. The Earthseed Black Arts Alliance they cofounded centers Black voices and fosters collaborations with Black and Indigenous artists. "The activist and artist community is complicated in Santa Fe, and I can see a lot of generational trauma among the colonized and the colonizers," they say. Still, Mashaal-Lively expresses hope amid humility. "I exist because of all my ancestors who were able to move through those challenges; I have a home here." ×

Jen Pack (백희숙)

"The nature of my work is one of integrating tensions," says Albuquerque-based artist Jen Pack (백희숙), and this process of assimilation is readily apparent in (he)r wall-hanging artworks. (He)r shaped frames, which s(he) fabricates (he)rself, challenge the genre distinctions of painting and sculpture. Likewise, (he)r use of fabric in lieu of paint asks the viewer to reconsider the materiality of painting and, thus, the identity of a painter.

Productively harnessing the tensions between seemingly contradictory or disparate entities and ideas, though, is not confined to the products of (he)r artistic process. Pack notes, for instance, that (he)r bicultural identity places (he)r in an "in-between" space, necessitating that s(he) be "comfortable being uncomfortable."

The artist recently adopted the written pronouns s(he) and (he)r "to honor my masculinity paired within my female presentation." S(he) adds, "I play a lot with language in the titles of my artwork and in presenting myself."

Tellingly, the artist recalls that one of (he)r earliest memories was "hearing yellow sing a song. Logic says it was the bees, but the hum was not the sound of bees. I felt and heard the color energy vibrating." Indeed, this childhood recollection of synesthesia—or the conflation of sensory experiences—portends the concepts underlying (he)r then-future art practice and, perhaps, is emblematic of (he)r hybrid racial identity.

Pack's investigation of tensions manifests itself in (he)r broader project, which s(he)'s named *Soul Umbra*. According to the artist, *Soul Umbra* is the materialization of icons "from a space unseen." In other words, "they are precise projections of the soul's intentions that verbal language cannot articulate the edges of, exteriorized into corporeal form... It exposes the permeable boundaries of perception and the porous relationship between truth, beauty, and identity. It maps liminal fields." By concretely presenting what is materially absent, Pack creates an interstitial space that traffics *between* realms of the material and the ineffable, the expressible and the inexpressible.

"My mom told me once," Pack says, "that I sew like a construction worker." (He)r mother's insight, then, encapsulates the overarching sentiment of (he)r person, (he)r process, and (he)r product: a bicultural artist/fabricator who conflates painting and sculpture, sews (he)r paintings, and developed a practice dedicated to the movement between this realm and the ethereal. ×

Mikayla Patton

Mikayla Patton's (Oglala Lakota) installations and works on paper are full of texture, design, metaphor, and discovery. Patton's materials and processes are heavily influenced by her education as a youth at the Pine Ridge Reservation in North Dakota, where she learned embroidery and beading in school. She utilizes many of these traditional techniques in her contemporary practice which merge and blend to result in works that are both culturally powerful and aesthetically reflective of the current moment.

Her three-dimensional project *Paper Parfleche* is an interpretation and connecting thread to an object used by Plains tribes, a parfleche or traveling trunk historically used to carry important possessions. Patton first came across the parfleche when she was working in collections management during her undergraduate studies and found that these once culturally embedded objects had very little written context. In contrast, she found more than ample amounts of inaccurate and outdated anthropological texts on North American Plains tribes, which she shredded and pulped to create the hand-made paper and foundation of her parfleche. Patton's variations are etched with shapes and patterns, stitched together with leather, and contain finely beaded motifs. Both the laser-etched designs on the exterior and the hand-beaded motifs on the interior of the boxes are of Lakota origin and communicate power and femininity. *Paper Parfleche* re-engages a multi-generational legacy while transforming damaging scholarship.

Patton's concurrent works on paper prioritize the beaded elements as both cultural motifs of femininity and design components like mark-making. Patton's hand-made paper, lane-stitched beads, and the integration of porcupine quills and grasses are lush with texture and color while championing Lakota traditional techniques. As with *Paper Parfleche*, Patton merges her cultural knowledge with a minimalist aesthetic in a way that makes both seem of her own invention. ×
