## 'transfeminisms' exhibition uplifts voices from vulnerable communities around the globe

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. — Opening March 1, 2025, at Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art (SMoCA), "transfeminisms" brings to light a mul plicity of urgent, pressing and ongoing issues faced by women and queer and trans people across the globe.

The major survey show has been unveiled in sec ons at London's Mimosa House since March, and when it travels to SMoCA, a part of the nonprofit Sco sdale Arts, in 2025, it will take over all five of the museum's galleries, remaining on view through Aug. 24.

"From the moment I heard the exhibi on's tle, I understood it to be a project of curatorial ac vism — an exhibi on that highlights and uplifts voices from vulnerable communi es across the globe with the hopes of gathering broad support, understanding and empathy," said Jennifer McCabe, director and chief curator at SMoCA. "I am proud to be part of an exhibi on that advocates for women and women-iden fying people across geographies, races and cultures."

McCabe, who is one of the exhibi on's four primary curators, said the advocacy nature of the show could be in mida ng to undertake publicly, but the significant financial support it received from na onal funders speaks to the necessity of projects like this. Grants to support the exhibi on came from the Na onal Endowment for the Arts, Terra Founda on for American Art and the Andy Warhol Founda on for the Visual Arts.

"transfeminisms" outlines strategies of resistance through collec ve ac on, care and radical imagina on to generate a more equitable future. The exhibi on explores the lineage of feminist art prac ces by facilita ng dialogue between emerging and more established ar sts from around the world. In addi on to the four curators, three assistant curators and ten global curatorial advisors helped bring the exhibi on together.

"When I conceptualized this project in 2022, my inten on was to organize an exhibi on that would be in conversa on with 'Global Feminisms,' another large-scale exhibi on that I co-curated with Linda Nochlin 17 years ago," said Maura Reilly, one of the show's other curators. "The aim with 'transfeminisms' is to inves gate feminist art prac ce today, and again from an intersec onal standpoint. The interna onal curatorial consor um that collaborated on the project has culled together a superb selec on of ar sts, whose themes range from feminist care and kinship to radical imagina ons and collec ve ac on."

Reilley is the director of Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University in New Jersey and the Founding Curator of the Elizabeth A. Sackler Center for Feminist Art at the Brooklyn Museum. She and McCabe first met a few years ago when Reilly came to Arizona State University to lead the school's Museum Studies Program, where McCabe is also an instructor.

Reilly told McCabe of her idea for revisi ng the "Global Feminisms" show. London's Mimosa House was already on board to host the show. So, McCabe lined up SMoCA as its second stop, and the first loca on where the exhibition will be shown as a whole. Due to Mimosa House's small size, "transfeminisms" has unfolded there over five dis nct chapters.

Reilly is a leader in feminist art history, and under McCabe's leadership, SMoCA has sought to elevate contemporary women ar sts in recent years through exhibitions featuring women ar sts and growing its collection with works by women ar sts. McCabe notes that art history has systemically ignored women ar sts.

The tle of "transfeminisms" is inten onally provoca ve. McCabe said it's about "all the different defini ons of feminism."

The prefix "trans" implies "across, beyond, through, on the other side of," while the plural "feminisms" recognizes the innumerable defini ons of feminism worldwide. The curators' intend for "transfeminisms" to be understood within an inclusive and decolonial context — one that takes museum patrons across feminisms and encompasses various "trans" possibili es.

Organized into five themes, the exhibi on will explore ac vism, labor, fragile archives, care/kinship and radical imagina ons. While those five themes are being explored separately at Mimosa House, they will be on view together at SMoCA, spread across four galleries.

Meanwhile, SMoCA's fifth gallery will be dubbed the "Forum" space. It will have resources for community groups to come in and use the space for mee ngs, whether it's an organiza on of women in business or a collec ve from the LGBTQIA+ community. SMoCA also intends to program the space with monthly events, including film screenings, poetry readings, open mic nights and more.

SMoCA — named "Best Art Museum" by the Phoenix New Times — is located at 7374 E. Second St., Sco sdale, Arizona 85251. It is open Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Thursdays, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Visit SMoCA.org for informa on.

Admission is \$13–\$16 for non-members; \$10–\$13 for students, seniors (65+) and veterans; and free for Sco sdale Arts ONE Members, healthcare workers, first responders, and patrons 18 and younger.
